

# MANAGEMENT, BSBA

The Management curriculum is designed to emphasize human values and develop a sense of responsibility to employers, employees, customers, and the community. The curriculum provides professional education and training for students preparing themselves to manage their own businesses or seek managerial positions in the private and public sectors.

Managers are responsible for planning, organizing, directing, controlling, and representing a business or organization to many constituencies. To be effective, managers coordinate the work of specialists. A manager must understand human relations, skill in directing group efforts, and knowledge of the functional aspects of business, such as production, marketing, finance, human resources management, and accounting. Students majoring in management study the many areas in which managers must operate and topics directly related to managerial roles.

## Requirements

MGMT 300 OPERATIONS MANAGEMENT, MGMT 358 ORGANIZATIONAL BEHAVIOR, and MGMT 380 BUSINESS POLICY AND STRATEGY are required core courses and cannot be used to fulfill Management major requirements.

## CORE Requirements (General Education)

These quantitative requirements also apply to degrees in the College of Business:

- Students may apply no more than 60 credit hours of 100-level courses toward the degree.
- Students must apply no fewer than 60 credit hours of 200- and 300-level courses toward the degree.
- Students must have at least 18 credit hours (of the 60 credit hours above) at the 300 level.
- Students may transfer in no more than 70 credit hours from community colleges.
- The last 30 hours of any baccalaureate degree must be completed at Roosevelt University for the residency requirement or students need to take a minimum of 60 hours in-residence at Roosevelt University. Note that some majors have additional requirements for RU hours
- Students must have a grade point average of 2.0 or higher to graduate. Note that some majors have additional GPA requirements

- Students may apply no more than 51 hours in the major (BA) or 57 hours in the major (BS)

<sup>1</sup> First-Year Success is required of freshmen with less than 12 hours in their first semester at RU. Transfer Success is required of all transfer students with less than 90 hours.

<sup>2</sup> Ideas across Disciplines is required of all new students with less than 30 hours. It should be taken in a student's second semester at Roosevelt. ENG 101 is a prerequisite. Ideas across Disciplines courses cannot "double-dip" with Humanities or Social Science requirements.

<sup>3</sup> Experiential Learning courses can "double-dip" with major requirements/electives or any CORE requirement (but cannot "triple-dip" as all three). Transfer students who enter with 60 or more hours are required to take only 1 Experiential Learning course. Transfer equivalencies for Experiential Learning courses from other institutions can be evaluated by the Provost's office and program heads upon request.

<sup>5</sup> Higher-level mathematics may be substituted for MATH 110 QUANTITATIVE LITERACY.

<sup>6</sup> Grade of C- or better required in the Math course

<sup>7</sup> Required for all freshmen.

<sup>8</sup> Required for all Business majors other than Transfer students.

## Mathematical preparation

Quantitative skills are critical for the academic study of business. This is especially true for accounting and finance majors. For all students, required business classes such as FIN 311 PRINCIPLES OF FINANCE and MGMT 300 OPERATIONS MANAGEMENT are mathematically based. In order to complete the degree on a timely basis, students are required to take mathematical requirements, MATH 110 QUANTITATIVE LITERACY, ECON 234 ELEMENTARY STATISTICS, and any developmental courses required by the RUA) in the first semester and in each following semester until these requirements are completed.

## Business requirements

### Standards

All Business requirements taken by Business majors and minors must be satisfied with a grade of C- or better. A 300-level business elective is substituted for the international perspective course if an international course is in the major. MGMT 380 BUSINESS POLICY AND STRATEGY must be taken at Roosevelt and passed with a grade of C- or higher.
