

# ORGANIZATIONAL LEADERSHIP, BAOL

The Bachelor of Arts in Organizational Leadership is a program that provides a cutting-edge, multi-disciplinary approach to leadership issues. Organizational Leadership courses bring together the latest research in management science, humanities, social sciences, communication arts, technology, and ethics.

The Organizational Leadership (OLED) core courses are available fully online and are eight weeks in length. Some OLED core courses may be offered on campus on occasion; however, most courses are provided in an online format. Students who successfully complete the program will possess an understanding of themselves, others, and their organizations and will be able to identify a personal leadership style that fits within those contexts. They will also be able to identify necessary leadership skills in given situations and prepare a plan of action for improving organizational capabilities. Students will develop the ability to think critically about decisions in a socially responsible and responsive manner to the needs of the organization.

An Organizational Leadership degree leads to careers in consulting, employee development, recruitment, healthcare administration, association management, information management, human resources, labor relations, law enforcement, project management, strategic planning, and training, among others.

Ten courses (30 credit hours) are required for the Organizational Leadership major. Grade of C or higher required in all OLED courses. Minimum 2.0 GPA required.

## CORE Requirements (General Education)

These quantitative requirements also apply to degrees in the College of Business:

- Students may apply no more than 60 credit hours of 100-level courses toward the degree.
- Students must apply no fewer than 60 credit hours of 200- and 300-level courses toward the degree.
- Students must have at least 18 credit hours (of the 60 credit hours above) at the 300 level.
- Students may transfer in no more than 70 credit hours from community colleges.
- The last 30 hours of any baccalaureate degree must be completed at Roosevelt University for the residency requirement or students need to take a minimum of 60 hours in-residence at Roosevelt University. Note that some majors have additional requirements for RU hours
- Students must have a grade point average of 2.0 or higher to graduate. Note that some majors have additional GPA requirements
- Students may apply no more than 51 hours in the major (BA) or 57 hours in the major (BS)

- <sup>1</sup> First-Year Success is required of freshmen with less than 12 hours in their first semester at RU. Transfer Success is required of all transfer students with less than 90 hours.
- <sup>2</sup> Ideas across Disciplines is required of all new students with less than 30 hours. It should be taken in a student's second semester at Roosevelt. ENG 101 is a prerequisite. Ideas across Disciplines courses cannot "double-dip" with Humanities or Social Science requirements.
- <sup>3</sup> Experiential Learning courses can "double-dip" with major requirements/electives or any CORE requirement (but cannot "triple-dip" as all three). Transfer students who enter with 60 or more hours are required to take only 1 Experiential Learning course. Transfer equivalencies for Experiential Learning courses from other institutions can be evaluated by the Provost's office and program heads upon request.
- <sup>4</sup> Grade of C- or better required
- <sup>5</sup> Higher-level mathematics may be substituted for MATH 110 QUANTITATIVE LITERACY.
- <sup>6</sup> Grade of C- or better required in the Math course
- <sup>7</sup> Required for all freshmen.
- <sup>8</sup> Required for all Business majors other than Transfer students.
